


Saturday 25th May 2024

The famous Blackford Highland Games have been held since 1870. The current games are held on an area of land loaned to the community by the landowner. A condition of the loan is that the Highland Games are held there annually in May. We welcome visitors to our Games with a full list of events including throwing the hammer, tossing the caber, putting the shot, athletics, track and field events, Highland dancing, junior solo piping, trade and refreshment stands. **This year we introduce a female Heavyweight event.**




1	Tullibardine Distillery Visitors Centre

Saturday 25th May 2024

No where in Blackford is more than 10 minutes walk from anywhere else in the village and police and stewards are on hand to guide visitors. The games park opens to the public at 10am with highland dancing competitions and local heavyweight events beginning a little later. The official opening is at 12:30pm when the pipe bands lead the games chieftain into the park. The games official ending is around 4:30pm when the pipe bands salute the chieftain.





There are many trade stalls in the park with food and drink available in the park or in the village.

<u>Please note that alcohol must not be</u> brought into the park.

The official beer tent sells alcohol and it must be consumed within the designated area.

Tullibardine Distillery is open to the public and the historic Blackford Inn, a few minutes walk from the park, is open all day with a BBQ in the afternoon. In addition the village has a well stocked village store in the main street along from the park which has an ATM machine.

Our games programmes are free and there is no need to book tickets, simply turn up. Dogs are welcome but you must keep them under control at all times and clean up after them. Parking is easy in our village with on and off street parking widely available . Overnight camping is by prior arrangement only, please e-mail for availability.

Our local distillery has a visitor centre where you can enjoy a guided tour and a well stocked shop. It's approx. 1/3 of a mile (530 metres) from the Games Park and is a flat and level walk with one crossing point over the main road. If you would like the tour please phone first.


There is a beer tent in the park, but a short walk away (Approx. 390 ft. or 119 metres) is the historic Blackford Inn. The Inn hosts a Games day BBQ and a well stocked bar. The Inn has a childrens' licence so the kids are welcome. Party's of 8 and over should telephone ahead.

Blackford has an excellent village store. Once again a short flat walk (Approx. 1/3 of a mile) along our main street, crossing at the pedestrian controlled lights opposite the store. The shop also has an ATM and a variety of goods both fresh and packaged.

Blackford's Moray Street is flat and wheel chair friendly.

The ticket prices for 2024 are- Adults £10, Concessions £5, Children £5, under 5's are free. A family ticket is £25 (two adults and two children incld. Parking). We have a card machine facility at our box office.

We are approximately sixteen miles on the bus route from Perth or Stirling on the A9 North near Auchterarder. Within one hour of the city centres of Dundee, Glasgow, Edinburgh and St. Andrews.

The Trossachs lie ten miles to the north and the Ochil Hills a couple of miles to the south

The closest station is historic Gleneagles named after the famous 5 star hotel it serves. There is a regular bus service to and from the station to the village of Blackford. In addition, local taxi companies serve the village and station.

Blackford is a very flat village (on Moray St.) and the pavements are wide. Disabled parking is available in the park on a first come first served basis. The stewards will help you park. Please bear in mind though, the games park is mainly grass with un-tarmacked roads. Conditions underfoot depend on the weather. Disabled toilets are available. Events

The Kings of the Highland games are, without doubt, the heavy athletes and Blackford can boast a good turn-out over the years. Some famous names have graced our arena and Geoff Capes still holds the ground record for the 16lb and 22lb shot put set in 1982.

The Heavy Athlete

Intense training and dedication is the characteristic of the heavy athlete. This commitment to the sport is admirably demonstrated by Vlad Tulacek, one of our most successful heavies of recent years. The big man from the Czech Republic (Left-receiving trophies from Highland games legend Bill Ross) holds the ground record for the 56lb weight over the bar. Every year our spectators hold their collective breath in anticipation as he attempts to break his own record. No one, to date, has bettered him at Blackford.

Primary School Races

Started in 2015, the primary school races are just about as competitive as it gets. Some of the loudest cheers of the day accompany the races. The children compete for the Highland Games Silver Salver and this award has spent much of its life in the trophy cabinet of the Community School of Auchterarder. Blackford did win the inaugural competition though.

Highland Dancing

Highland dancing didn't feature in the first games of 1870 but appeared shortly after. By 1873 Blackford was an established and lucrative part of the circuit. The prize money per dance was 20 shillings. Modern Blackford is a busy competition with dancers from all over Scotland in attendance. The once virtually male-only event is now dominated by the girls.

Events (Contd.)

2019 saw the introduction of a Junior heavyweight Competition for under 19 year olds. Blackford were the first to take part and William & David McLaren introduced The McLaren Perpetual Trophy in memory of their grandfather William McLaren, Games Chairman of 1920. This year we continue the fiercely contended primary schools competitions. We have re-introduced solo piping after an absence of 83 years. We started, modestly, with a Junior piping competition judged by Roddy MacLeod MBE and Stuart Brown of TCSoA.
